Asperger's Disorder

Criteria for Asperger's Disorder

• At least two demonstrations of impaired social interaction:

- \checkmark Markedly deficient regulation of social interaction through multiple nonverbal behaviors, such as eye contact, facial expression, body posture and gestures.
- $\sqrt{\text{Lack of peer relationships that are appropriate to developmental level.}}$
- $\sqrt{Absence}$ of seeking to share achievements, interests or pleasure with others.
- \checkmark Absence of social or emotional reciprocity.
- At least one demonstration of activities, behavior and interests that are repetitive, restricted and stereotyped:
 - $\sqrt{\text{Abnormal (in focus or intensity) preoccupation with interests that are restricted and stereotyped (such as spinning things).}$
 - $\sqrt{\text{Rigid}}$ performance of routines or rituals that don't appear to have a function.
 - $\sqrt{\text{Repetitive, stereotyped motor mannerisms (such as hand flapping)}}$.
 - $\sqrt{Persistent}$ absorption with parts of objects.
- The symptoms cause clinically important impairment in social, occupational or personal functioning.
- There is no clinically important general language delay (the child can speak words by age two, phrases by age three).
- There is no clinically important delay in developing cognition, age-appropriate self-help skills, adaptive behavior (except social interaction) and normal curiosity about the environment.
- The patient doesn't fulfill criteria for schizophrenia or for another specific pervasive developmental disorder.
